Dear Families,

Communication about Learning

Classroom teachers have been using Seesaw to communicate students' learning throughout the term, creating a wonderful dialogue with families about learning tasks, group activities and classroom events. By facilitating communication between students and families about learning through Seesaw, our students are more connected to their learning and thrive on the feedback provided by their families.

Staff and students will continue to post regularly on Seesaw and provide families with information about learning activities and upcoming events. It important to remember that Seesaw is not designed to be used as the main communication method for families to connect with their child's teacher. We prefer parents to directly email teachers about individual student learning using the contact email addresses provided by teachers. Teachers will then be able to access these emails during work hours and respond in a timely fashion. Often, teachers will need to seek further clarification and need time to respond appropriately to families, and we are conscious of the work/life balance of teachers, so it is important that we work together to enable effective communication.

Any notices of absenteeism need to be sent for our record keeping purposes either via skoolbag app or phone.

Our Reconciliation Journey at Norwood Primary School

Over the past few weeks we have been celebrating National Reconciliation Week (27th May – 3rd June). Teachers engaged students in meaningful discussions about Reconciliation and what this means for our community, and our student leaders were responsible for providing a range of learning activities for classes. These leaders also led our Reconciliation Assembly, which included songs from several classes and some sharing of stories by some of our students. We were very fortunate to have one of our local Kaurna Elders, Uncle Mickey, attend our assembly and present a Welcome to Country. He shared some of his story and also explained the significance of the Aboriginal flag.

As a school community, we recognise the importance of the Reconciliation process and we are committed to continuing the journey of reconciliation at Norwood Primary School. Currently, we are planning a number of actions to create greater



awareness of Kaurna language and the connection that exists between First Nation's People and the land. This includes applying for a funding grant from Reconciliation SA and using student fundraising to support our initiatives. We are looking forward to learning with our local Kaurna community members to continue to build these connections. **Kind regards**,


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Happiness: a skill you can learn

Western neuroscience has now confirmed what Eastern wisdom has known for a long time: happiness is a skill we can learn.


Research shows that happiness, compassion and kindness are the products of skills that can be learned and enhanced through training, thanks to the neuroplasticity of our brains.



The Story So Far


Norwood Primary School's Technologies Room is where students engage in the digital and design technologies curriculum. In addition to a number of fundamental digital skills we have been learning that digital systems require input and output devices, that they process and store data and that numbers, letters, pictures sounds and colours are represented by 1s and 0s. Here is a breakdown of the learning so far this year:

- 1. Online safety. Understanding potential dangers and how to avoid them. (Part 1)
- 2. Familiarity with common operating and filing systems. (Part 1)
- 3. Effective use of Internet search engines for research (Part 1)
- 4. The history of computers and why they use the binary system.
- 5. Understanding the parts of a digital system. Understanding input, process, storage and output.
- 6. Recognising the internal components of a computer and what part each plays.
- 7. Understanding how digital systems use 1s and 0s to store and process numbers, letters, pictures and sounds.



What's happening next?

Next term we will be learning more about software. We will identify and define needs and design digital solutions in the form of algorithms. Lower years will be testing their algorithms on simple robots. The middle and upper years' students will be coding their algorithms to create programs that run on a digital device. We will follow on from this by designing and making working input devices that can be used with our code.



Feature - Tech Room Tuesdays

Every Tuesday at second break the Tech Room is open to give students the freedom to explore new ideas, try out different activities or further develop something that they are currently working on. The dismantle station, the museum, Lego, coding, animation and free working spaces are some of the options available to students.

A social deduction game in which players attempt to uncover each other's hidden role or team allegiance. Players can use logic and deductive reasoning to try to deduce one another's roles, while other players can bluff to keep players from suspecting them. This is a **real-life** version of the online game.

SA Rocks is a nature play based free activity. It is a giant game of hide-and-seek for kids



and adults alike. It's also this amazing group that everyone can be a part of. You colour, paint, design, write a message on the front of the rock. Then you can go hide it anywhere you like –
